Here are the workshop descriptions:

- 1. The FWCC World Plenary: Living the Spirit of Ubuntu
  This workshop will share about Gil George's experience with the
  FWCC World Plenary and host a discussion of the results of the
  Plenary held in South Africa in August. Gil George will relay the
  experience and provide a space to discuss the three thematic
  streams of Creation Care, Healing Historic and Current
  Injustices, and Living the Spirit of Ubuntu; and how these
  streams intersect to map the future of FWCC.
  Gil George is the Operations Manager for FWCC Section of the
  Americas.-
- 2. Foot-washing Fun with Derek (in-person only)
  To wash another person's feet, as Jesus did, and to allow another person to wash our own is to practice deep humility and can be powerfully transformative. This workshop is focused on facilitating a Christ-centered worship experience. In-person only. Dress appropriately.

Derek Lamson has been a worship leader and SCYMF activist since 2017, and currently serves on Faith and Practice Committee.

3. Jesus, the Roman Empire, and the State of Israel
This workshop will explore: (1) Jesus' harsh warning in Luke 13:15 when he was told about Rome's massacre of Jews in worship,
"Unless you repent, you too will perish"; (2) the current situation
in Palestine and Israel; and (3) if Jesus is still relevant, what
might repentance look like for those who witness Israeli
atrocities today?

Paul Parker is a professor emeritus of Elmhurst University where he taught in religious studies for 32 years. He has worked, studied, and volunteered in Palestine and Israel frequently since 2004, most recently as the principal of Ramallah Friends School's high school for the last two years.

4. Let's Talk About Death and Dying (no, really!)
Baltimore Yearly Meeting has just published an important book (with a little help from a couple of SCYMF folks): "A Tender Time: Quaker Voices on the End of Life." Includes chapters on aging well, end-of-life planning, and how friends, caregivers, and meetings can respond, and lots of resources. This workshop will introduce the book and its benefits and encourage local meetings to explore it together. The book is available through

# Minutes Klamath Interfaith Food Pantry Board Meeting Minutes August 13, 2024

Present: Lee Curran, Dan Curran, Jay Wang, Leigh Tolton, Brion Pinkerton, Alicia Pinkerton,

Phyllis Olson, Margo McCullough, Linda Warner

- 1. The minutes from the July 16 meeting were approved as written.
- 2. The group welcomed new board member Margo McCullough who is representing Klamath Falls Friends Church.
- 3. The group discussed how pantry nights are going. Everyone thinks the new process is working and having two computers speeds up intake enormously.
- 4. The group put together an invitation list for the Open House scheduled for Friday, October 18, from 5:30 until 7 pm. Linda will work on an invitation, get board input, then send it out in September. She will also send a request for cleaning and food/beverage prep to churches to share with congregations. Cleaning date is TBD but will probably be the week of the Open House.
- 5. The group decided to distribute the prize-winning seven turkeys and seven large chickens donated by OSU Extension and 4H/FFA at the upcoming August 20 food pantry rather than store them for Thanksgiving boxes. Preference will be given to larger families.
- 6. Phyllis reported that Sacred Heart is no longer involved in Thanksgiving food distribution so Interfaith will distribute

Thanksgiving food as part of the November 19 pantry. The group will ask for special traditional Thanksgiving food donations from the congregations and food cards from Sherm's will be purchased.

- 7. Alicia suggested that the carry out kids wait in the pantry office and we could also provide snacks for them.
- 8. The group decided to not do a school supply drive since most schools provide school supplies to classroom teachers for their students.
- 9. Linda will send an announcement to the churches about the blanket/sleeping bag drive. We also still need toiletries, feminine hygiene products and infant diapers and toddler pullups.
- 10. Linda will contact KUHS Key Club and DECA to see if they would like to volunteer as carry out staff. Volunteers from OIT might also be an option.
- 11. Lee will be selling her unique jewelry and talismans at the Mystic Market on Sunday, August 18 from 10 until 4 pm. She is donating all the proceeds to the Food Bank.
- 12. Phyllis will contact a potato farmer she knows to ask about donating potatoes to the pantry.

Next meeting will probably be on September 10 the before pantry stocking. Linda will confirm time of food delivery with Marc Kane.

#### **Clearness Committees:**

A method invented by the Quakers, that protects individual identity and integrity while drawing on the wisdom of other people. The Clearness Committee is testimony to the fact that

there are no external authorities on life's deepest issues, not clergy or therapists or scholars; there is only the authority that lies within each of us waiting to be heard. Parker Palmer (nice article her wrote on clearness committees):

A clearness committee is a process for discernment within the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). It is often used when a member of the meeting seeks to reach clarity on how to respond to a concern or dilemma.

Like Quaker business meetings, meetings of clearness committees are considered a form of meeting for worship and are based on the principle that the inner light is present in all people. The process thus is one of aiding the person seeking clearness in finding the answer within, rather than offering outside advice or guidance. A clearness committee can be requested by anyone for any reason and will usually be appointed by one of the standing committees of a Monthly Meeting.

In addition to those requested by individuals, clearness committees are appointed by most meetings when a person applies for membership and when a couple seeks marriage under the care of the meeting. In these cases, the committee serves the dual purpose of helping the person or couple find clearness that this is the proper step and ensuring that the meeting is ready to take the member or couple under their care.

Clearness committees were frequently used by the Quaker-influenced Movement for a New Society and occasionally show up in other progressive organizations in the Philadelphia area, especially those with pacifist or nonviolence orientations.
