Here are the workshop descriptions:

1. The FWCC World Plenary: Living the Spirit of Ubuntu
This workshop will share about Gil George's experience with the
FWCC World Plenary and host a discussion of the results of the
Plenary held in South Africa in August. Gil George will relay the
experience and provide a space to discuss the three thematic
streams of Creation Care, Healing Historic and Current
Injustices, and Living the Spirit of Ubuntu; and how these
streams intersect to map the future of FWCC.

Gil George is the Operations Manager for FWCC Section of the Americas.-

2. Foot-washing Fun with Derek (in-person only)

To wash another person's feet, as Jesus did, and to allow another person to wash our own is to practice deep humility and can be powerfully transformative. This workshop is focused on facilitating a Christ-centered worship experience. In-person only. Dress appropriately.

Derek Lamson has been a worship leader and SCYMF activist since 2017, and currently serves on Faith and Practice Committee.

3. Jesus, the Roman Empire, and the State of Israel
This workshop will explore: (1) Jesus' harsh warning in Luke 13:15 when he was told about Rome's massacre of Jews in worship,
"Unless you repent, you too will perish"; (2) the current situation
in Palestine and Israel; and (3) if Jesus is still relevant, what
might repentance look like for those who witness Israeli
atrocities today?

Paul Parker is a professor emeritus of Elmhurst University where he taught in religious studies for 32 years. He has worked, studied, and volunteered in Palestine and Israel frequently since 2004, most recently as the principal of Ramallah Friends School's high school for the last two years.

4. Let's Talk About Death and Dying (no, really!)
Baltimore Yearly Meeting has just published an important book
(with a little help from a couple of SCYMF folks): "A Tender Time:
Quaker Voices on the End of Life." Includes chapters on aging
well, end-of-life planning, and how friends, caregivers, and
meetings can respond, and lots of resources. This workshop will
introduce the book and its benefits and encourage local

meetings to explore it together. The book is available through Barclay Press prior to the workshop.

Laura Simmons spent two years as a hospice chaplain and has lost both her parents; she wishes others were more prepared for this eventuality.

Klamath Interfaith Food Pantry Board Meeting Minutes September 10, 2024

Attending: Alicia and Brion Pinkerton, Lee and Dan Curran, Phyllis Olson, Mary Prange, Leigh Tolton, Jay Wang, Lou Schneider, Linda Warner

- 1. The minutes from the August 13 board meeting were approved as written.
- 2. The cleaning "party" has been scheduled for October 7, beginning at 10, Bring a sack lunch. We'd like this information added to each
- church/fellowship/bulletin/newsletter/announcements
- 3. The Open House is on Friday, October 18, from 5:30 until 7 pm. Phyllis will prepare coffee, ice tea water and a relish plate. Lee is getting a cake. Requests will be made for other finger foods. Linda will create an invitation and run it by board members before she sends it out. We'll put out a donation box and a way for people to sign up to volunteer.
- 4. Thanksgiving Meal Box plans were discussed:
- a. Forms requesting a meal box will be given to clients at both September pantries. Linda will compile those and fill out forms for those volunteers to "adopt a family" and prepare a meal box.
- b. The donors will return their forms to respective board members and begin gathering

Thanksgiving food items for their families. Food boxes will be delivered to the pantry on

November 15, from noon until 4 pm.

- c. Boxes will be stored and covered in cabinets in the intake waiting room and distributed to clients at the November 19 th pantry. Remaining boxes may also be distributed on Nov 26 th .
- 5. New and used (laundered) blankets and sleeping bags will be collected at Interfaith Churches/Fellowships, brought to the pantry by board volunteers, and be distributed to those in need

during December and January. Wanda Young is taking donations of yarn to knit/crochet blankets for the drive. Please bring yarn to Klamath Lutheran Church. Linda will contact Running Y to see if they have used blankets they would be willing to donate.

- 6. KUHS Key Club and DECA members may be interested in pantry carryout. Alicia will contact Henley Key Club to see if they are interested in helping again this year.
- 7. Lee has raised \$825.32 from her jewelry sales and is selling again on September 14. All proceeds will be donated to the Food Bank and be designated from Interfaith Food Pantry. Food Bank director Lori Garrard will present KIFP with a special thank-you check at our Open House.
- 8. We don't have a source for donated potatoes this year, though it was suggested that if anyone is buying potatoes from Friends of the Children that they buy two boxes and give one to our food pantry.
- 9. Linda received 11 out of 45 responses to the December pantry date change survey. December 10 and 17 and December 23 and 30 received an equal number votes. The board broke the tie and voted December 10 and 17 as pantry nights. Linda will post signs and notify the Food Bank.
- 10. Mary and Phyllis will be purchasing margarine, bread, and cheese to supplement Food Bank food. Eggs are too expensive at this time to purchase them.
- 11. Pastor Lou Schneider asked that we either open or close the board meeting with a prayer. There were no objections. He closed with a prayer.
